New Laws Passed by VA General Assembly Now in Effect

While more than 900 new laws took effect *Expands Death Penalty to Include* July 1, 2010, VSI would like to touch on a few Auxiliary Police key pieces of legislation that will promote • Legislation adds auxiliary police officers the public safety of Virginia residents and aid law enforcement officers in our efforts to fight crime. In particular, the following laws support victims of domestic violence, combat

gang activity, provide for those that protect us, and help make Virginia a safer place to work and raise our families.

SB468 (Howell)/ HB930 (Bell) — Extension of **Protective Orders**

• Allows a petitioner who has obtained a protective order in a case of family abuse or stalking to seek an extension of the order for up to two years. Keeps Virginians safer by making it easier for victims who continue to be in danger to maintain valid protective orders.

SB620 (Deeds) — Established Internet **Crimes Against Children** Fund

Legislation implements a \$10 court fee on each felony or misdemeanor conviction to support the Internet Crimes Against Children Fund which will support grants, training, and equipment for local law-enforcement agencies' use in investigating and prosecuting Internet crimes against children and to the Department of Social Services to support the Virginia Child Protection Accountability System.

HB907(R.Bell)—Reports of

• Allows the attorney for the Commonwealth or law-enforcement, upon the request of the school superintendent, to share certain information with the school superintendent concerning a student's delinquency case involving a misdemeanor offense listed in the statute, if such disclosure does not jeopardize the investigation or prosecution of the case. The information that may be released includes details of (i) the terms of release from detention, (ii) the court dates, and (iii) the terms of any dispositional orders.

HB682 (Miller, J.H.) — Creates Gang- HB1159 (Oder) — Improves Virginia's Certain Acts to School Authorities by Local Free Zones "Move Over" Law

• Expands penalty enhancements for gang activities to include those occurring on the property of any publicly owned or operated community center or recreational center. As a result, law enforcement officers and prosecutors will be better able to combat gangs and deter those who would target youth.

SB486 (Hurt)/ HB1121 (Gilbert) — Sharing Juvenile Criminal Gang-Related Activity

• Places an affirmative duty on the Department HB1198 (Iaquinto) — Strengthens of Juvenile Justice to provide information to Virginia's Sex Offender Registry law enforcement that may aid in initiating or furthering an investigation of a criminal street gang.

SB520 (Norment)/ HB934 (Bell) —

And VSI is pleased to announce that Hampton, Virginia Sheriff B.J. Roberts, was sworn in as the 69th president of the National Sheriffs' Association during the conference. Sheriff Roberts was sworn in by John W. Jones, VSI Executive Director. Virginia Delegate, Kenny Alexander, read declarations and noble remarks came from Virginia Governor Bob McDonnell, Senator Mark Warner, and Representative Bobby Scott.
